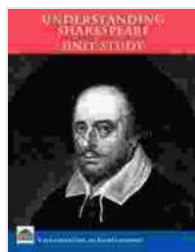

DICTION

The choice of words and style of expression an author uses to convey the specificity or informality of the work. Romeo and Juliet uses a variety of diction to portray the personality of each of the characters, e.g. Benvolio

I pray thee, good Mercutio, let's retire:
The day is hot; the Capulets abroad,
And if we meet we shall not 'scape a brawl;
For now, these hot days, is the mad blood stirring.
Act 3, Scene 1

FORESHADOWING

The use of subtle hints to suggest what might happen in the future.

A pair of star-crossed lovers take their life;
Whose misadventured piteous overthrows
Doth with their death bury their parents' strife.
Act 1, Prologue

IMAGERY

The use of vivid descriptive language to appeal to the senses.

Had look, the morn in yester
mornin' had
Walks o'er the dew of yon high
meadow hill.
Act 1, Scene 3

PERSONIFICATION

Giving human characteristics to non-human things like animals or objects.

The grey-eyed morn smiles on
the frowning night,
Cheerless the sun's eyes keep
with streaks of light.
Act 2, Scene 3

MOTIF

A dominant or recurring theme or idea in a work. Light and dark are a recurring motif in Romeo and Juliet.

METAPHOR

An implied comparison between two unlike things without using the words "as" or "like".

But, soft! what light through yonder window breaks?
It is the east, and Juliet is the sun.
Act 2, Scene 2

SYMBOLISM

A device in which a person or object takes on another meaning beyond its literal one, e.g. poison symbolizes the feud between the Capulets and the Montagues.

There is the gold, worse poison to men's souls,
Doing more murders in this loathsome world,
Than these poor compounds that they may
not sell.
Act 2, Scene 7

SIMILE

The comparison of two essentially unlike things using the words "as" or "like".

Death lies on her like an untimely frost
Act 4, Scene 3

ALLUSION

An implied or indirect reference to a person, place or event of cultural or historical significance.

Well, in that hit you miss,
She'll not be hit
With Cupid's arrow; she hath
 Dian's wit,
And in strong proof of chastity
well-exercis'd,
From age to age shall children love
the Dian's monument.
Act 1, Scene 2

TOPE

The attitude or approach of the author towards the subject or central theme of the work. The tone in Romeo and Juliet is sympathetic.
