

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Thesis Statements

Ask yourself - Is my thesis debatable? The answer must be "Yes!"

Characteristics of a Thesis Statement

- Only one topic (your subject) + your comment (point of view)
- At least one verb
- A focus narrow enough that it can be developed in the assigned length of the essay
(e.g. 750 words or approximately 3 pages)
- Not a simple announcement

Useful Hint: To be sure that a thesis statement is debatable, you can use the word **should** or **must** in your statement.

Compare these two statements:

1. There are bad consequences to plastic surgery.
A simple announcement.
2. Plastic surgery should be illegal.
Debatable statement with topic (plastic surgery), verb (should be), and a point of view (illegal).

Developing a Thesis Statement

First, you need a topic.

Example: Topic you have in mind and need to narrow down = Drug Use

This subject is too broad for an essay of 750 or 1000 words, so you need to narrow the focus to a specific aspect of drug use.

First attempt at a thesis statement: Bad drug use.
Rejected - this is still too broad a topic.

Second attempt: Drug use is detrimental to society.
Rejected - this is not an idea presented in debatable form. Most people would agree with this statement.

Third attempt: Illegal drug use is detrimental to society because it encourages gang violence.
